Fever, swollen lymph nodes and a persistent green or yellow nasal dischargeif you're not experiencing these symptoms and you have the headache- then you likely have migraine.¹

Diagnostic Criteria for Migraine

The most widely accepted classification amongst the medical community comes from an international body called the International Headache Society (IHS).²

The IHS classifies a condition as migraine when:

I. The pain has at least two of the following characteristics:

- Moderate to severe pain intensity
- One-sided location in the head
- Pulsating or throbbing quality
- Aggravated by general movement

2. There is at least one of the following

- Nausea and/or vomiting
- Sensitivity to light and noise

3. The headache attack lasts from 4-72 hours if untreated.
